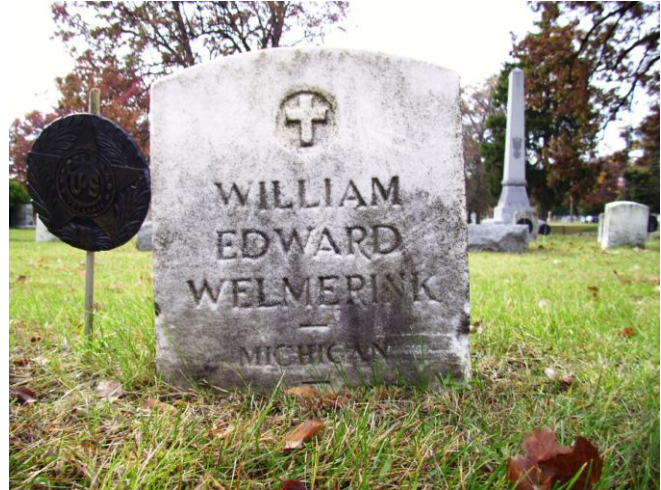

Eight more Grand Rapids boys, the largest number of any day so far, are included in the latest casualty lists and all but one were members of the One Hundred and Twenty-sixth infantry. Three were killed and five seriously wounded in action.

William E. Welmerink, age 21 years, is another member of Company M. which is giving such a splendid account of itself that was killed in action Aug. 2. One of his latest letter to his mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. B.J. Welmerink, 856 Watson ave, N.W. says: "I got a few shots at the boche, and hope to get a few more." William was the only remaining boy out of four in the family. Besides his parents he is survived by three sisters, Dena, Minnie, and Henrietta.
